To my brothers and sisters from the Polish Community,

I offer my warmest congratulations on this occasion of the centenary of Poland's Regained Independence. Freedom is an extraordinary gift from God: it is self-creative, for by our choices we make ourselves into a new creation. Freedom is the opportunity, the wisdom and the will to do that which is most good and true and beautiful and in the process to recreate ourselves, to become new persons, a new nation.
